### **Safer Hambleton Hub**

The Safer Hambleton Community Safety Hub is based in North Yorkshire Council and accesses countywide safety services, facilities, projects to reduce crime, disorder and anti-social behaviour, and co-ordinates multi-agency problem solving processes as well as managing CCTV and working towards the Prevent Duty.

As you will no doubt be aware the unitary authority North Yorkshire Council was launched on 1st April 2023, which brought together the services previously provided by eight councils in the County (District's Boroughs and County).

Partners should not have experienced any change in our service as we continue to work with you all to support our local community.

North Yorkshire and York's Community Safety Hubs are multi-agency teams that coordinate partnership activity to address issues that have an impact on the safety of our communities. They have a focus on those most in need of help in order to intervene at the earliest opportunity and promote community resourcefulness.

### **Exciting News for Hambleton Community Action**

June 2023 saw the launch of a new community space at 159/160 High Street, Northallerton. The venue will be a place in the local community where people of all ages can come together to enjoy a hot drink and spend some quality time in other people's company.

There will be a communal sitting area which will provide access to IT facilities and the internet for free. A jigsaw and book swap are to be launched, with friendly staff and volunteers available to provide information about local community services and volunteering opportunities.

### **Community Safety Hubs**

Local help and support for community safety initiatives across North Yorkshire.

Our Community Safety Hub (Safer Hambleton) covers the market towns and surrounding villages of Northallerton, Bedale, Thirsk, Easingwold and Stokesley and consists of two council officers and an officer from North Yorkshire Police. Where needed there is capacity to bring in the fire service, social landlords, probation services, youth services, voluntary services and other local agencies to tackle issues as they arise.

When crime and anti-social behaviour issues are highlighted or trends identified, multi-agency problem solving interventions can be quickly put in place to help our neighbourhoods stay safe. We have access to countywide community safety services and can facilitate projects to reduce crime and disorder as well as working towards the Prevent Duty.

Our Community Safety Hub is a multi-agency team that coordinates partnership activity to address issues that have an impact on the safety of our community. We have a focus on those most in need of help in order to intervene at the earliest opportunity and promote community resourcefulness.

The work has seen crime and anti-social behaviour levels drop significantly over recent years for residents and

The focus is mainly on early intervention and prevention. Our primary aim is the safeguarding of vulnerable people.

Through the Hub, multi-agency problem solving is the key to tackling troubling behaviour in our towns and

villages and all organisations work together to solve issues and

incidents as quickly and efficiently as possible.

The North Yorkshire Community Safety Partnership takes the strategic lead for statutory responsibilities. It brings together the responsible authorities, supported by other relevant organisations, to fulfil their statutory responsibilities to work together in accordance with the Crime and Disorder Act 1998.

### **Introducing North Yorkshire Community Messaging**

North Yorkshire Community Messaging is a free email messaging service from North Yorkshire Police and the Office of the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner, providing news and updates on policing matters that are relevant to you and your local community.



### **Motorcycle Safety**

The York and North Yorkshire Road Safety Partnership is a partnership of local authorities, emergency services and other North Yorkshire agencies working together to educate, inform and train. We aim to lower the number of road casualties across the county of North Yorkshire.

We work together on a number of road safety campaigns; one of which is reducing the number of collisions involving motorcyclists.

Motorcyclists are disproportionately represented in our road casualty statistics; motorcyclists account for around 26% of killed or seriously injured casualties but only form around 7% of the traffic on our roads.

Analysis of Police collision reports shows that of the bikers who crashed the majority of riders (90%) are men, over half are aged 40 to 69 years of age and nearly half of all collisions occurred on A roads. Locally the A170 road between Thirsk and Scarborough has the greatest number of collisions. Nearly half of the riders lived in North Yorkshire, but the beautiful landscapes also attract a lot of riders from outside of the county.

The main reason for motorbike crashes on North Yorkshires roads is loss of control either while negotiating bends, while braking or while overtaking. Group riding also poses more of a risk than solo riding. Fatigue is another factor; long ride-outs are physically tiring, and this affects concentration and judgement.

The York and North Yorkshire Road Safety Partnership run a number of engagement events specifically for motorcyclists such as BikeSafe, Biker Down and Fire Bike.


BikeSafe is a national Police run motorcycle initiative, aimed at working with motorcycle riders in a relaxed environment. BikeSafe workshops aim to cover rider attitude, collision causation, cornering, positioning, overtaking, observation, braking, hazard perception and use of gears.





Biker Down is a free three-hour training course run by Fire Service bikers for bikers. Those first few moments after a collision can be critical and Biker Down answers some of the questions bikers might have if they were to be the first on the scene – something which is particularly relevant for bikers who like to ride in a group and are statistically more likely to be involved in an accident. The session contains information about crash scene management, some casualty care including basic CPR and a module on the science of being seen. All upcoming Biker Down courses are advertised on Eventbrite.

Fire Bike is an exciting new project to promote motorcycle safety in North Yorkshire. Fire Service volunteers ride popular routes and attend motorcycle meeting points to engage with bikers and educate about road safety. They can promote safety messages about visibility, fatigue and safe riding behaviours while being part of the biker community. ### **Inclusive Sports**

A number of opportunities are available for people so that they are able to engage in physical activity regardless of their background, ability or needs:

#### **Prime Time**

Prime Time is an inclusive sports initiative for people of any age or ability offering low intensity social sport opportunities.

Activities include Boccia, a game similar to bowls, and New Age Kurling, which is like Curling you see played on ice but using stones with ball-bearings so it can be played on a smooth indoor surface. All activities are played from a seated position. Sessions are led by a qualified instructor.

## **FEAST supports more families** across North Yorkshire this summer

More families and young people across North Yorkshire are expected to benefit from the hugely popular Holiday Activities and Food programme, known as FEAST, this summer, as the programme moves its booking system online.

North Yorkshire Council has been allocated a total of £1,378,320 by the Department for Education for this year's provision of Easter, summer and Christmas activities. To deliver the programme, the Council has awarded a coordination contract to North Yorkshire Together, which lasts until March 2025. This summer, for the first time, families who are eligible for benefits-related Free School



Meals will receive vouchers directly via their schools to book their free places for the over 100 FEAST activities online.

Max May, Strategic Director at North Yorkshire Together comments: "Our aim is for as many families as possible to access FEAST this summer and to enjoy the fantastic benefits it has to offer. By notifying parents and guardians about their vouchers directly through HolidayActivities, and enabling them to book and manage their places on that system, we hope to reach even more eligible families this summer, and beyond."

North Yorkshire County Council's executive member for education, learning and skills, Cllr Annabel Wilkinson, said in a press release this January that she was delighted with the success of the programme.

"The FEAST programme offers a vitally important service to families, especially at a time when people are experiencing difficulties caused by the increasing cost of living. It is also important that young people have something productive and fun to do during school holidays," she said.

"Feedback over the past couple of years by those who attend has been very good and most go on to attend multiple sessions; learning new skills, making new friends and growing in confidence around what they are able to achieve." FEAST is open to all children and young people in North Yorkshire. Those who receive benefits-related Free School Meals can attend for free and also receive a hot meal or packed lunch. Across the area, FEAST has over 100 activities for families to choose from, whatever activities children are into.

### Spread the word about FEAST

North Yorkshire Together would like to encourage any organisations across the county who are working with children and young people to share information about FEAST, so that as many eligible families as possible can benefit from the programme.

### **Hambleton CCTV Team; Round-up of Success Stories**

News from the CCTV Team is that work continues on the upgrade of the CCTV system for Thirsk and in anticipation of the welcome return of the ShopWatch Scheme to the Town. ShopWatch is a crime prevention scheme that provides assistance and security to local businesses. It creates a network of town centre businesses who are linked to each other and North Yorkshire Council's Hambleton CCTV Control Room, by a two-way radio network. Its purpose is to deter and ultimately assist with the prevention of crime such as shop lifting and anti-social behaviour.

The Team continues to be busy and working in partnership with Northallerton Shopwatch and local police to apprehend suspects implicated in crime including retail crime, here are some of the highlights:



#### **During April:**

- A member of Northallerton Shopwatch reported that 3 males were suspected of stealing items from a store. CCTV monitored and tracked the males to a vehicle, which they continued to monitor and track as it left. The details were passed to North Yorkshire Police, who stopped the vehicle and all 3 males were arrested, goods (including other stolen property from other stores) recovered and the vehicle was confiscated for being used in crime
- A member of Northallerton Shopwatch initially reported that a possible theft was in progress. CCTV monitored the vehicle in question and passed direction of travel to North Yorkshire Police, who stopped the vehicle although no stolen property was found the vehicle was seized due to a motoring offence.
- Report received of an intoxicated male threatening to harm members of his family. CCTV monitored the male who was subsequently arrested.

#### And in May:

- CCTV assisted to locate a male who was wanted for arrest.
- Report received of an assault in Thirsk Market Place. CCTV assisted to locate 2 individuals who were arrested.

### SHEDUCATION - beat the garden thief

Secure the access to your garden area by locking gates and using thorny bushes next to walls and fences Have you visibly marked the contents of your shed? It is recommended that you mark your property with your postcode or other recognisable features and note the make and any serial numbers. Photograph valuable plants, ornaments, and garden furniture.

External security lights which are activated by movement are a strong deterrent to a thief.

**D**oors and windows of sheds and outbuildings need securing. Use good quality security fitments such as padlocks and bolts.

Use coach bolts or non-return screws to secure door hinges and security fastenings.

Chain cycles, mowers, ladders, and tools to strong anchorage points on shed framing or floor.

Alarms for sheds and outbuildings are inexpensive and can be purchases from DIY shops.

Together we'll crack crime. Join a Neighbourhood Watch or Countrywatch Scheme.

**E**xamine your insurance policies. Check that your household policy covers you for theft from your garden and outbuildings.
