# The Most Reverend Desmond Tutu

Thankful memory of this wonderful human being.

One of the great and abiding images of the second half of the 20th century was Desmond Tutu and Nelson Mandela dancing in the courtroom at the end of the closing session of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in Cape Town. Nelson Mandela asked his friend Desmond Tutu to chair the Commission.

It was a bold and creative way of helping a nation divided brutally between black and white learn to live in glorious technicolour by facing up to the horrors of its past and by putting the Christian imperative for forgiveness alongside the need for truth as the only way of achieving reconciliation.

And Desmond Tutu was asked to chair it because this incredibly joyful little disciple of Jesus Christ was one of the few people in South Africa other than Nelson Mandela himself, who could unite the nation and carry the trust of everyone.

In this respect, he was a giant.

The world itself feels a little smaller without him. His expansive vision of how the Christian faith shapes the whole of life has touched many hearts and changed many lives. The Anglican church in particular gives thanks for one of its greatest saints. But Christian people everywhere, and all people of goodwill, will today be mourning the loss of someone who showed the world what following Jesus looks like and where it leads.

Our prayers today are particularly with his family and with our sisters and brothers in the Anglican Church of South Africa. When I go to my chapel this morning to celebrate the Eucharist on this, Saint Stephen's day, I may dance a little jig in thankful memory of this wonderful human being. May he rest in peace and rise in glory.

## New heating and lighting ...

Plans are being finalised for the new, much needed, heating and lighting in the church. Donations to the restoration fund over the last few years will be used to fund this work, which will hopefully go ahead in 2022.

## ... and internal porch?

However, additional work is required to make full use of the sunlight and heat that are blocked out from the South by the existing internal porch and could be harnessed by its replacement with a glass porch of the kind often seen in church entrances. Work included in this phase of the project would also improve disabled access.

#### **FUTURE OF ST MARY'S, ALNE**

It is clear that church attendance has changed with the pressures of modern life and especially with virtual services in recent years that are accessible online as live streams or to view at any convenient time. This means that the usage of our churches is being closely scrutinised and, over the next few years, decisions will be made by the Church of England about the future of some of these historic village assets. At present, there is no definite or immediate threat to St Mary's but, in order to secure the future of this ancient 12<sup>th</sup> century (in parts) building, the village will need to demonstrate it is of value and fully utilised in whichever way residents choose, within reason.

Financial support goes a long way to demonstrate that facilities are valued by the local community. If you feel able to set up a small, regular monthly or annual donation to support the above works and those that will be required in the next few years to maintain and restore the beams in the tower by making it more waterproof, keeping it woodworm free and the bells functioning safely, please get in touch using the contact information above. Bank details will then be provided to set up a direct debit or standing order.

Without the ongoing generous and demonstrated support of the local community, the future of St Mary's will be up for debate in the not too distant future.

Please do make full use of your church as the attractive village asset that it is and not just for baptisms, weddings and funerals – important though these are.

## A few years in the life of the Village clocks

The Walkers and Mortimers have been doing the Village Hall clock since about the summer of 2017 when my son Alex first started to do it towards his Duke of Edinburgh Silver award (along with the Church clock). Between my two sons (Alex and Tom) and the Walkers two sons (also Alex and Tom-can you believe it!!) the two families have kept it going from 2017 until present day with help from us parents in between the times when they weren't doing their DofE awards. It's been a lovely thing to do for the community and all of us have enjoyed it.

The boys have shown dedication going week in and week out and we have used all the tips John Teesdale kindly passed on as their mentor at the beginning, including how to manage times when it stops or when the hour goes back or forward. (Not as easy as it may first sound as the hands must not be wound backwards and really should only be moved on a small amount.) The clock keeps good time only losing a couple of minutes a week and a good head for heights is needed to get up to the face where the winding mechanism is!

The boys have also (with guidance and mentoring from Alan Daniels) kept the church clock going too over the same period of time, this time with Alan taking back the role which was his originally, in between the times the boys weren't working on their awards. It's helped the boys collect 4 Bronze and 2 Silver Awards; and 2 Gold and 1 Silver are still in the pipeline!

We are very grateful to Alan, John and Peter Bond for their support and trust in the boys over the years and we are very happy to carry on being keepers of the village clock! We are also grateful to John and Alan for the opportunity given and have thoroughly enjoyed being able to give a little back to the village that we have loved living in!

Thanks to Alne Parish Council, there is now no need to guess as to which flood was the higher. A new depth gauge has been erected on the west side of the Avenue bridge in Alne and shows the height of the water in metres above normal. Our thanks to the landowner for his permission and advice, to Councillor John Newton for his fabrication and to Councillor Eddie Edwards and Allium Organics for their assistance in installation.

We have been in regular touch with NYCC on the question of the missing footbridge over the river Kyle. Their official word in January 2022 is that 2022/23 funding for footpaths is looking more healthy and they are "reasonably confident" that our bridge will be restored, probably in the summer of 2022. He is a fine guitar player with a mellow singing voice, but it is the power and strength of his carefully crafted memorable songs that will stay with you. Chris is based in Kent, so we are fortunate to host him in a live concert performance locally here "up north". Some of his songs are more political with acerbic views, but others are more personal and charming, such as My Darling's Downsized, the personal true story of his wife's decision to take early retirement.

# Alne Oil Co-operative

The Alne Oil Co-operative is a founder member of the Lower Swale Syndicate of Oil Co-operatives. Collectively, nearly 1,000 Syndicate members purchased 1,789,488 litres of fuel oil in 2021.

Our agreement with the supplier ties the price members pay to the commodity (ex-refinery) price for fuel oil. This ensures that we are not affected by market fluctuations such as occurred last autumn when a certain amount of panic buying occurred. Syndicate prices were, at that time, on average, around 15p per litre cheaper than the lowest open market price (source: BoilerJuice, supplier syndicate prices). Ordinarily, we beat the BoilerJuice lowest price by between 3p and 5p per litre.

Members can order at any time and our supplier, Tate Fuels, has undertaken to deliver within 10 working days from order. The price charged will be that applying on the delivery date. (Preferential prices are applied January to November inclusive. December deliveries will be charged at the supplier's normal rate, as this is their busiest month.)

If not a Member, why not join? You will undoubtedly save money by comparison with your existing supplier and Tate's service has been outstanding!
