How the Church of England works

One question that I have been asked regularly since I was ordained in 2008 is how does the Church of England work? And where does the money come from?

The easy way to answer the first question is to compare it to everyday life. Once you reach 18 years of age you can register to vote with your local authority. Once registered they will send you a ballot card every time you are entitled to vote in elections at all levels of local government, national elections and referenda.

In the Church of England there are 4 levels of governance; The Parochial Church Council (PCC), The Deanery Synod, the Diocesan Synod and the General Synod. However, the voting system is different.

You register to vote with the PCC of the parish you live in. That allows you to vote at public meetings of that PCC. To vote at the next level up, the Deanery Synod you need to join the PCC and be elected to represent the

PCC on the Deanery Synod. This principle applies all the way to the top of the Church of England. So the only way you can vote at the General Synod is to be elected onto it.

Members of the Deanery Synod are made up of clergy and laity and they assist in the administration of the Deanery. If a decision needs to be voted upon, the options are for all to vote as one body or for the clergy and laity to vote separately; and they must both vote the same way for the decision to be ratified.

At Diocesan and General Synod a third body of voters is added to the mix, the House of Bishops. F or major decisions, like the installation of Women Bishops, all three houses must vote the same way.

Now the second question. Let's begin by dispelling a myth. Although the Church of England has her Majesty the Queen as our Supreme Governor we receive no direct funding from government. We can apply for government funding and grants for which we meet the eligibility criteria, just like any other organisation. The rest of our income is generated within the Church.

At all levels of the church from the parish up to the national church there are fixed and liquid assets that generate income. However, in this era of low interest rates and small dividends, it meets only a small part of our financial needs. The rest comes from the contributions made by ordinary members of the Church and its supporters, either by direct payment or through fundraising.

The money raised at parish level is used for a number of purposes. The church building needs to be maintained and all the bills paid such as utilities and insurance.

In the Diocese of York the major outgoing is our annual contribution to the Common Fund. In simple terms this money is spent in 4 areas. The first is to fund our clergy. It pays their salaries, housing, training and pensions. The second part funds the Diocese. It pays for the permanent staff that are needed to run the Diocese and projects designed to grow our congregations and spread the word of God. The third and fourth parts are small compared to the first two and fund the National Body and the world-wide Anglican Communion respectively. For most rural parishes and benefices the

contribution to the Common Fund is used to fund the clergy who serve among us.

I hope this helps.


